For this exhibit, students are displaying the finished Sustained Investigation series from their AP Art & Design Portfolios. Portfolios were submitted to the College Board on May 20th and will be evaluated for AP credit. For this series, students were asked to develop an idea over time, and discuss their inspiration as well as evolution of their concept and process for the written part of the exam. Students submitted up to 15 images for this part of the portfolio, and an additional 5 pieces for the Selected Works portion of the portfolio. All this work was created while working from home and shows the incredible resilience it took to continue with a cohesive body of work during the pandemic.

Pottery Projects

Continued skill development using and adapting techniques from Ceramics 1 with a focus on functional vessel forms. From the DRAWING & PAINTING CLASSES

Drawing II

In Drawing II we explored working with patterns and textures via colored pencil and collage, built on our understanding of values and composition via working with still life, and investigated layers through abstraction as well as exterior night drawings with incandescent light. Self-portraits engaged the students in interpreting their distorted reflections in spoons, car side mirrors and convex mirrors. The final project allowed for students to take bigger risks with materials and concepts as they worked from the prompts, "the sky is the limit", "map of my life", "a fly on the wall", or "scavenger hunt".

Painting II

In Painting II we explored what it means to work with light, show transparency and build texture and layers. For the self-portraits we chose to paint distorted reflections from metallic objects or refracted through glass. Finally, we put the whole quarter together in a final painting called "the Gestalt". Students had the choice to work from several prompts such as, "the sky is the limit", "map of my life", "a fly on the wall", or "scavenger hunt".

Drawing & Painting III

From the PHOTOGRAPHY CLASSES

Photo II: Self-Portraits

This semester began with an assignment called "The Familiar Place." Students were asked to choose an impactful memory/experience and then photographically convey it in narrative form. This work built on formal, technical, and visual literacy skills that were introduced in Photo I. For their next project, students were shown self-portrait work by the photographer, Cindy Sherman in preparation for the "Self-Portrait: True Self and Alter Ego" assignment shown in this Spring's Art Festival. Students learned how objects within a photograph often convey a powerful metaphor or communicate cultural concepts and traits not easily photographed. Accurate exposures, use of lighting, tighter compositions and editing, as well as experimentation were the technical requirements. Please enjoy this awesome work!

Photo III: Book Project

This semester Photography III students were asked to produce a comprehensive body of work on a topic of their choice. Students chose subject matter that interested them personally and learned how to translate it into a broader cultural realm. The goal was to link separate photos into a larger cohesive whole using a book format. Additionally, this project was intended to illustrate and build upon a culmination of conceptual, aesthetic/formal, technical, and visual literacy skills learned in prior Photography classes.

Kudos:

Kudos go out to my Photo II students for becoming creative and disciplined photographers while overcoming their reluctance to engage in a lively discussion in a Zoom setting. This is the first Photography I and II class in the history of UHS to go completely digital. It has been interesting to compare over two decades of analog/darkroom work with a similar curriculum using only digital photography. And the outcome? Regardless of my bias toward in-person teaching and darkroom work, this year has shown that the students were able to build relationships/rapport without meeting in person and produce strong, if not stronger work with digital technology. Additional Kudos go to my Photo III students. Each showed great creativity, discipline, and independence this semester. Their books are evidence that they are able to reflect and transform personal experiences into socially conscious works that are both visually exciting and inspirational!
